Since they are locally polynomial, they are easy to evaluate. In the univariate case, there is only one kind of cell in any useful partition, namely, an interval, and its boundary consists of two separated points, across which polynomial pieces would have to be matched as one constructs a smooth piecewise polynomial function. This can be done easily, with the only limitation that the number of smoothness conditions across such a breakpoint should not exceed the

polynomial degree (since that would force the two joining polynomial pieces to coincide). In particular, on any partition, there are (nontrivial) compactly supported piecewise polynomials of degree $\sim k$ and in $C(k-1)$, of which the univariate B-spline is the most useful example.
